Article VI, Section 3, A 1-6 **SECTION 3. DISTRIBUTION OF ELECTED REPRESENTATIVES**

A) Residential Senators

- 1) The apportionment of elected Representatives shall be determined every two (2) years beginning with the enactment of this Constitution. (Even-numbered years)
- 2) The determination of Associated Students for purposes of apportionment shall be made by the Executive Director based upon the aforementioned two (2) year average total of registered undergraduate students as of the close of the previous fiscal year and any other relevant factors, and shall be ratified by a majority vote (50% + 1) of the Senate by the fourth (4th) regular meeting of Winter quarter.
- 3) On-Campus Senators based on one (1) on-campus Senator for every one-thousand (1,000) undergraduate students residing in university residence halls, rounding off to the nearest one thousand (1,000).
- 4) Off-Campus Senators based on one (1) off-campus representative for every one thousand (1,000) undergraduate students residing off-campus.
- 6) University Owned Housing Senators are based on one (1) university owned housing representative for every one thousand (1,000) undergraduate students residing in university owned housing, rounding off to the nearest one thousand (1,000)."

Add the following article to the AS Constitution: Article VI , A 1-4 **SECTION 3. DISTRIBUTION OF ELECTED REPRESENTATIVES**

A) Residential Senators

- 1) The distribution of the residential senators shall be based upon a fixed number of senators representing each constituency.
- 2) Five (5) On- Campus Senators shall represent the students residing in university residence halls.
- 3) Thirteen (13) Off-Campus Senators shall represent students residing off-campus.
- 4) One (1) University Owned Housing Senator shall represent students residing in university owned housing.

Legal Resource Center: Sobering Center: The Associated Students Legal Resource Center (LRC) provides legal education and consultation to students on topics

Legal Resource Center: Sobering Center: The Associated Students Legal Resource Center (LRC) provides legal education and consultation to students on topics such as criminal matters, landlord-tenant disputes, marriage or divorce, consumer complaints, traffic tickets, personal injury, harassment, and debtor-creditor issues, among others. There are several hundred arrests for public intoxication in Isla Vista each year—some of whom are UCSB students. Currently, this involves removing a person off of the streets who is too intoxicated to safely care for one's self, a night in jail, an arrest on one's criminal record, unavailability of police officers on the IV streets due to transport of arrestees, and expensive court fines, all of which are avoidable if there was a local Sobering Center. The Legal Resource Center (LRC) plans to accept applications from entities to provide this direct service for current UCSB students. The creation of a sobering center would allow for more patrol officers on the streets to better protect and serve Isla Vista residents, and would provide a safe alternative to a traumatic night in jail for students. Students would also be required to attend and complete a program through the Alcohol and Drug Program on campus. The money provided from this fee (which would be collected from Summer 2014-Spring 2019 when the program becomes self-sustaining and paid for entirely out of user fees) would be in direct control of students who are members of the student run Legal Resource Center (LRC) advisory board. The LRC board would solicit applications annually from UCSB and community entities interested in providing operations, facility rental, and staffing of a sobering center to be used by UCSB students.

The Student Union Revitalization Fund (SURF) Initiative: The Student Union Revitalization Fund (SURF) Initiative would improve student service facilities of the University Center; reform and increase student oversight of the University Center; and create or improve space for student-focused activities. Final plans would be subject to approval by the student-majority governance board, but currently include new or expanded spaces such as: a 24-hour study/computer lounge; Campus Learning Assistance Services (CLAS) classrooms; a Health and Wellness Center; Centers for Veterans, Former Foster Youth, Transfer/Commuter students, and International students; an Environmental and Sustainability Resource Center; space for ASUCSB organizations such as AS Senate, The Bottom Line, Student Initiated Outreach and Retention Committee, and Finance Board; a permanent AS Bike Shop location; a new Visitor Center; expanded space for Counseling and Psychological Services; a multipurpose meeting and student group space; an indoor dance and performance space available to student groups at no additional charge; and an expanded AS Food Bank.

The SURF fee is comprised of project expenses (either design costs or construction debt), maintenance and operations expenses, contribution to building maintenance reserves, campus administrative assessment, Associated Students administrative assessment, and return to aid (financial aid).

The initial fee would fund the design of the project and would begin in fall of 2014 at \$20.51 per undergraduate per quarter (including summer). Upon project occupancy in fall of 2018, the fee would increase to \$64.41 per undergraduate per quarter (including summer). Once the debt is retired, which is projected to be in 2048, the fee would be reduced to eliminate the debt payment component. The reduced fee would then continue by reaffirmation every 2 years by the undergraduate student body as required by the AS Constitution. The matrix below illustrates the fee. These include, but are not limited to, sending student delegations to existing and emerging conferences, such as the annual Western Regional Conference and the Queer People of Color Conference; funding events at the annual UCSB Pride, such as drag shows and educational workshops; supporting QComm projects, such as the "Ask a Queer" local high school outreach program; supporting the events of the many LBGTQ student organizations on campus, such as the Queer Student Union; and maintaining QComm's relationship with the local Pacific Pride Foundation, such as involvement in the annual AIDS Walk and Santa Barbara Pride.

Composting Program: This fee will support and sustain the Associated Students Department of Public Worms (DPW) composting program, which began in 2004 and partners with A.S. Recycling on the UCSB Waste Management Plan. DPW focuses on composting UCSB's food waste and on using the beneficial compost in the campus and community to further encourage sustainable food production. The organization also conducts regular workshops on composting and teaches attendees how to reduce food waste in their homes and backyards. Thanks largely to student efforts UCSB already leads the UC system in composting, but stable funding is needed to address remaining gaps such as a lack of indoor collection locations and insufficient outreach to the campus community. Expanded effort will include a revamped processing facility and a student-run, compost-fueled demonstration farm.

A.S. Bike Committee: The A.S. Bike Committee will use this funding to implement a roundabout that will expand the intersection at the northwest corner of the SAASB (Student Affairs Administrative Services Building) building. This project will also widen bike lanes leading up to the roundabout and will add physical barriers so students can more effectively navigate traffic. The A.S Bike Committee will use this funding of \$2.18/quarter for 12 quarters (including summer) in conjunction with the Office of Campus Planning and Design. This funding will begin fall 2014 and be terminated after the 12 quarters ending summer 2017. This funding will be in addition to the \$1.25/quarter lock-in that the A.S.
